
Susan Lenz, a fiber artist, was our Artist in Residence for 2022. She lived in Catoctin Mountain Park from September 7-28. During her residency, Susan presented a

program at the Catoctin Mountain Park Visitor Center, two programs at the Thurmont Regional Library and a program in Fairfield, Pennsylvania for a quilter's guild. She also hiked every trail in Catoctin Mountain Park (some more than once), made 60 fiber bowls and nearly completed a crazy quilt that is her donation to the Catoctin Forest Alliance art collection. All of Susan's presentations maintained a strong focus on conservation. Most of the materials she uses in her creations are recycled, aside from some new thread. She pointed out that the highest percentage of material in the landfill is fabric. Susan is doing all she can to recycle fabric and other materials used in her projects. 
We have waited for 3 years (due to the COVID interruption) for the Charcoal Sled. from the Charcoal Trail to be redone (See *The Catoctin Forest Alliance Bulletin* – Vol. 12 May, 2022 for additional pictures). On Tuesday (July 19, 2022) the old sled was dismantled, placed in my truck and left for Nappanee, IN where it arrived on the 22nd of July. The Amish had agreed to make a new sled and return it to the park in October, 2022. Well, the "new" sled has returned and was placed on the Charcoal Trail on Friday, October 28th. With the help of some 10 young men the 600-700 pound sled was carried ¼ mile and placed at its home in the park. The pictures do not do it justice, you must see it to really understand the detail of the sled. The many angles involved in making it and the love that went into it. It took four people from the Amish community in Nappanee, Indiana 280 hours to complete this project. David Miller, Howard Chupp, Dale Hochstetler, Wayne Borkholder and Christ Hochstetler were the carpenters.

Catoctin Mountain Park is a prime example of the truth and beauty of that poetic message. As autumn continues to unfold in its plethora of colors around the mountain, I'd like to reflect on some of the accomplishments and highlights of the past few months by the

Division of Interpretation and Education.

From the public information desk, the park was highlighted as a great place to bring four-legged visitors, especially dogs, we were interviewed by a reporter from "The Dog People." Check out the article about the park and our great B.A.R.K. Ranger program here.

Public programming returned as well, with the park continuing to strengthen the connection with Thurmont Library through "Tyke Hikes" on the second Friday of every month. Record attendance to one hike topped at over 50 children, parents, and adults! Campfire programs returned on Saturday nights as well this year, as rangers provided programs on a variety of topics, including weather, animals, and the history of the O.S.S. here on the mountain.

In our education department you may have seen a blur, which would be Ranger Carrie loading up a vehicle to present at a school or charging up the mountain to Chestnut Picnic Area to welcome students to the national park. She continues to take the education department of the park to new heights, reaching over 3,600 Frederick County 5th graders in the spring and early fall programming! This included welcoming students from the Maryland School for the Deaf for the first time ever.

Our digital presence has helped the park reach newer audiences, as Ranger Dorothy spearheads a social media committee with our two seasonal rangers, Victoria, and Tiffany. The park is now active on Instagram and our website is completely 508 compliant, ensuring accessibility to all online visitors. Check out Catoctin's website, Facebook, and Instagram for all that is happening and help us spread the word.

In the volunteer field, Rachel, our Community Volunteer Ambassador, has continued to build on the great work of Ranger Ron. She successfully led numerous service projects over the summer months managing a volunteer force that numbered over 10,000 hours of time given to the park. Thank you to all the volunteers who contributed at the visitor center, on education programs, and along the trails. The park is a better place because of the dedication of these volunteers. Importantly, Rachel helped the park welcome 305 youth volunteers who contributed 2,817 hours of their time.

The vibrancy of the park is not limited to the color of the leaves this fall. That vibrancy is also evident in the park's interpretive and education staff and volunteers humming along in the visitor center, roaming the trails, and welcoming visitors to park program. 
