Mel Poole Retires as Superintendent of Catoctin Mountain Park

On August 25, 2015 Mel Poole retired after 37 years with the National Park Service. A large group of colleagues, friends and family gathered to mark the occasion. Many people spoke and shared stories about Mel and then Mel took the microphone and gave a beautiful address, one that he said was harder for him to deliver than some eulogies he has given.

Below are some excerpts from his address.

“Seldom is it the case in our modern society that we are blessed with a job so fulfilling and rewarding that it is a joy to come to work each day. Even more seldom is anyone so fortunate as to be surrounded at work by colleagues who, almost universally, deeply share that joy and dedication to the mission. Thankfully, and with monumental gratitude, I have now shared these blessings with all of you for 37 years. It has truly been the experience of a lifetime.

So, it is with mixed feelings of melancholy, excitement and hope for the future, and immense pride in all of you that I take this difficult step. It also presents an opportunity for me to broaden and diversify my personal journey before it is too late to have one.

The only job better than being the Superintendent of a national park is being a visitor in one. So, I am retiring while my moving parts still move; so I can do the things that I joined the National Park Service to do. Look for me building my birding life list, wandering, and coming to a park near you. In retirement, I plan to extol the virtues of the Golden Age pass to other retirees and all fee collectors while traveling with my family to visit all the parks I missed on the first pass. You may recognize the footprints but the memories belong to me.”

“I started with NPS back in June, 1978. Work with this agency has taken me to 48 states and two countries where I’ve worn many hats and shared many smiles. I may forget names and a few of your faces. But I will never forget those who crossed my path and some who have gone on home to Glory (not the movie, the real one). I have truly broadened my horizons both internally and externally. Passion for this national park idea is what brought many of us to this place and time. It is what puts us on the side of angels and gets us up every morning for work.”

“My days working in national parks are drawing to a close. Just as you can sense the coming of a cooler season on the land when it turns golden in the fall (or, in my case, silver) and the air turns cooler and promises the coming of winter. There is a sadness in these moments, but a gentle joyousness, too, as I acknowledge our friendships and all the kindnesses that I have received through the years. That I must say goodbye to this wondrous place and all the wonderful people I have been associated with along the way saddens me. But my life is now under new management and I wish you all the best! Every sunset here is a sunrise somewhere else.

We all have baggage that we accumulate during our careers and I'd like to lighten my load by leaving this poem that sums up my feelings.

The Look-Out's Goodbye

Mel was the driving force behind the formation of the Catoctin Forest Alliance as a friends group for Catoctin Mountain Park. It was also his dream to have an Artist in Residence (AIR) program in the park and that dream was fulfilled. Since 2010 the parks (Catoctin Mountain Park and Cunningham Fall State Park) have hosted 2-3 artists per year. The program attracts artists from all over the US and has been a huge success.



On behalf of CFA, Linda Sundergill presented Mel with an oil painting; one from the AIR collection, done by Nancy Haver entitled “Chimney Rock”. Mel was particularly fond of the painting and it had been hanging in his office since May of 2014. CFA made it an official gift to Mel in honor of his wonderful career and retirement.

Best wishes to you Mel and family. We hope your retirement will be just as fulfilling as your career in the Park Service has been.

Artist in Residence Linda Johnston led three (3) public Nature Journaling Workshops and one (1) workshop for a local Girl Scout Troop. A fourth program was cancelled due to weather. Two of the programs took place near the Catoctin Mountain Park Visitor Center and one program was held at the library. Participants were guided through the process of creating a journal with personal reflections - in words and art - on the natural world. They learned that a nature journal is a place for growing thoughts, feelings, observations and ideas; for connecting to the natural world, and observing the many surrounding life forms. The national park and the deck at the Thurmont Regional Library were perfect spots for participants to begin documenting their personal observations.

On Saturday, October 24, 2015, a local tradition will refuse to go quietly in the night at Cunningham Falls State Park and the Catoctin Furnace Historical District! The *Spirits* will return to tell their tales of days gone by!

The “Spirits of the Furnace” is an entertaining living history event that will take place from 7 pm to 9:30 pm. Visitors will be led by spirited guides on a night hike around the historic Catoctin Iron Furnace. Frequent stops will be made to hear local stories from costumed characters as they recall lore of the furnace and the Frederick area.

Hikes will take approximately one hour and will cover some uneven terrain in grassy or forested areas. Participants are encouraged to wear shoes appropriate for hiking, warm clothing and bring a flashlight. This hike may not be appropriate for very young children and does not accommodate strollers or wheelchairs. Tickets must be ordered beforehand and includes the hike and refreshments (limit one per visitor).

This event is made possible through the cooperative efforts of the Harriet Chapel, the Silver Oak Academy, Catoctin Forest Historical Society and Cunningham Falls State Park.
