A Note from our President, Jim Robbins

Spring is here and summer is on its way. The birth of the forest with all the rain is a great time to watch the transformation of the forest. With the opening of Rt. 77 the mountain will again be alive with many visitors eagerly wanting to hike trails, take in the wonderful views, smells of the forest and vistas. Please stay safe as you do all these things.

Catoctin Forest Alliance, has been working hard on projects throughout the Catoctin Mountains and beyond. Read in this newsletter about all the projects that we have been doing.

Amish Projects

For the 12th year of service, the Amish from Nappanee, IN arrived on March 4, 2024 for a month of working in Catoctin Mountain Park and at ThorpeWood. The projects included building a hoop structure in the lumber yard, replacing seven roofs (taking cedar shakes off and replacing with new cedar shakes), replacing a floor on a flatbed trailer, assembling a portable sawmill and mounting it on the trailer, helping to shred fallen branches along Park Central and cleaning up around Round Meadow. The last week they worked on projects at ThorpeWood and built a bridge by and over a creek, finished the barn lining with old timber, made signs and built a book stand.

We not only work with the Amish group from Nappanee, IN but there are three other Amish groups we coordinate. During March we also had a group from Monta Vista, CO. This was the first year for this group and they worked on projects at Fort Union, New Mexico. They replaced picket fencing, worked on two old buildings and did a number of small projects.

This was also the first year for an Amish group from Fort Wayne, IN. This group worked at New River Gorge National Park & Preserve in West Virginia.



Thurmond Depot. Thurmond was a bustling coal town in the early 1900's and is still a stop on the Amtrack Cardinal line. The Amish helped to restore, replace, and paint the siding on the station.

Restoration of the Kaymoor Steps—a set of 821 wooden steps that descend more than a mile into the New River Gorge. All materials had to be hand carried.



Station. Our 4th Amish group was from Oden, IN in southern Indiana and for the 6th year they have been working at Cumberland Gap National Historical Park in Middlesboro, Kentucky. They work at an historical site called Hensley Settlement. This settlement was established in 1903 by Burton Hensley, Sr. on Brush Mountain high in the Cumberland Mountain Range. This location is only accessible by 4-wheel drive vehicles (Park tours only) and takes about an hour to get to the top. The characteristics of early pioneer life were present and kept alive at Hensley Settlement. This would become a unique settlement. They were self-sufficient at a time when the rest of the nation's people were relying on each other for their needs. As a result of the Hensley's and Gibbon's efforts, an isolated community of rural Appalachia survived until the last inhabitant, Sherman Hensley, left in 1951.

Want to Volunteer in the Cunningham Falls State Park (CFSP) Aviary and Visitor Center and more?

Invasive weed pulls:

- If you enjoy being in the woods, solitude and don't mind getting dirty, this is for you. The park has several scheduled pulls each month through the spring, summer and fall. We focus on different species based on time of year and hold them weekdays and weekends to accommodate varied schedules. Registration preferred so a proper number of tools are brought and specific instructions provided. There will be several scheduled in June.

Manor Area Visitor Center/William Houck Nature Center staffing:

- Do you enjoy administrative and inside work with the public? Currently our William Houck Nature Center and Area is closed but is anticipated to reopen hopefully by June. With that said, both buildings on weekends and holidays from April-October from 10am-2pm are staffed by volunteers when possible. There is room to expand that based on volunteer availability. This task involves opening and closing the building and while open, answering park visitor questions such as, where are the restrooms? How do I find the falls? Where should I hike? Where are the campgrounds? What kind of animals live in Maryland? If you enjoy sharing your knowledge of the park with others and talking to the public or are ready to learn, this is the right spot for you.

Trash pick-up:

- If you want immediate gratification of seeing the work you've done and enjoy solitude and making your own schedule, this is a good fit. Year round there are areas to pick trash in the park. Once you're trained on where to pick and find supplies for picking, the when, where and for how long is up to you.

Animal Care:

- Do you love animals and cleaning and have attention to detail? The park's 17 animal ambassadors including 10 reptiles (snakes and turtles) and 7 birds of prey (owls, hawks and an eagle) require daily cleaning of enclosures and feeding. This involves bending, stooping, scrubbing, cutting up rodents and fish, cleaning up animal guts and poo in all weather conditions. A <u>one-year commitment</u> is required due to the training that staff have to invest, as well as a weekly shift which is generally 3-4 hours of work. It must be conducted during daylight hours. Current shifts open

would be either Saturday, Sunday, Friday. If you're interested but those days don't work for you, training as a substitute would be considered. Resume required with interview as well as minimum age of 18+.

Gardening:

- In a similar vein as the invasive weed pulls, this involves weeding various gardens but is flexible on day, time and location. This is a great position for being in nature and having solitude while working at your own pace. Once you're trained on areas to maintain, where to get supplies and the goal for that area, you can pick and choose when to volunteer.



Artist in Residence by Linda Sundergill, AIR Chairman

Two Artists in Residence are arriving in September



- **Rachel Wojnar** will be in residence at Cunningham Falls State Park September 8-22, 2024. Rachel is a multimedia artist and educator from Cumberland, Maryland. Their practice is focused on themes of ecological entanglement, biology, and naturalism as they relate to human experiences of community, transformation, and healing. Using both traditional media and raw natural material, they highlight ecological anecdotes as tools for understanding, specifically recognizing parallels between systemic abuse of the environment and of women, trans, and queer bodies. They hold an BA in Art and Art History from McDaniel College and an Interdisciplinary MFA from Hartford Art School. Rachel has studied art and ecology through place-based experiences across the US, Mexico, and Ireland, and has exhibited in the US and Ireland.
- **Reagan Herndon** will be in residence at Catoctin Mountain Park September 5-26, 2024. She is a visual artist currently living in Raleigh, NC. She works mainly with acrylic paint, but enjoys exploring other mediums such as wood, mixed media, and digital techniques. After graduating from East Carolina University in Greenville, NC with a BFA in painting and drawing she started working as a concept artist designing environments for previously unheard-of worlds. This passion has continued in her personal works as she focuses on themes of life and nature and blend them with surreal imagination. She takes the realistic natural elements around us and exaggerates their color and shape to create fascinating compositions to give the audience new but familiar worlds to explore. She uses her work to get the viewers' attention and inspire them to look at the unique life and landscapes we have all around us in a new way.
- Joint Presentation at the Delaplaine Arts Center September 13, 2024 Art at Noon at The Delaplaine Arts Center will feature Rachel Wojnar and Regan Herndon as they discuss their history as artists and their work as Artists in Residence in the Catoctin Mountains. The program will last 20-30 minutes and is open to the public. The Delaplaine Arts Center is located at 40 S. Carroll St., Frederick, MD 21701.

Jeffrey Lockwood was our Artist in Residence in May 2023. He is a writer and a PhD in entomology. Here is a description of his new project:

• The Project and Product

The environmental challenge that I engage is: "How can we, as visitors to protected lands, engage authentically, meaningfully, and ethically with the natural world given our everyday experiences with a fast-paced, technological framework?" The answer to this question in my book takes the form of philosophically compelling, intellectually intriguing, and aesthetically evocative reflections.

Less is More: Enchantingly Brief and Evocatively Deep Reflections from America's National Parks, involves a somewhat unusual format that engages readers with an interest in the natural world—and the National Parks, in particular. Over the last 11 years, I have been an artist/writer-in-residence at 15 National Parks, Seashores, Lakeshores, Monuments, and Battlefields across the country. At each location, I crafted a set of meditations while imposing a relevant "rule" as to the number of words. For example, the shortest pieces are precisely six words from Mesa Verde NP, reflecting the six pilasters around the circumference of a

kiva; the longest are exactly 271 words, honoring the number of Black men and women who died laboring at the iron furnaces fueled by the timber from Catoctin Mountain Park. The result is a collection of "chapters" organized into thematic sections. Each entry begins with a short, essay-like explanation of the constraint and theme, accompanied by a black-and-white photograph, followed by short reflections. The book will be ~200 pages with ~5 pages after each section for an element called "Your Turn" which provides evocative thinking/feeling writing prompts and space for the reader to draft their own short works.

My short-form pieces, which occupy a literary space amidst prose poetry, lyric essay and playful aphorism, are ideally suited for those spending time outdoors and seeking a few minutes of reflection to deepen their experience. Using just a few words draws the reader into becoming a co-creator, through a kind of individualized gestalt that "fills in" what is unsaid and invites a continuing contemplation of meaning.

Nancy Arbuthnot was our virtual Artist in Residence in 2019 during COVID. She was invited back in 2020 for an actual residency in Catoctin Mountain Park in 2020. Nancy is a Professor Emerita at the US Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., where she taught for 29 years. She recently did a podcast that you can listen to using the link below.

The podcast is done as part of the Poetry and Literature Center at the Library of Congress "Interviews with US Poets Laureate". Nancy reads some of her poems and is interviewed about her life and how that relates to her work.

On the way up to Gold Mountain Lookout at the edge of the road, on his hind legs feasting on blackberries the biggest black bear I've ever seen eyes us, his look demands what are you doing here in my garden?

We stop the pickup when with practiced nonchalance of one who owns the place he drops down on all fours lumbers up a rise, stands up and stares us down.

We're driving through land my work partner's community the Colville yet holds. He scratches his chin, gives me a look, with a twinkle muses "Bear must think we're trespassers."

IN THE TWO ROOM SCHOOL

We memorized poems in the heat of a wood furnace: Under the spreading chestnut tree, the village smithy stands... It rang false, was nothing like my grandfather's forge.

We believed little our teacher told us. The earthquake that rattled our school knocking a few bricks from the chimney was a greater power's judgement

on an hysterical teacher who in her panic herded us down a shakey building's wooden stairs to recess in a muddy field we called the playground.

IN THE SCHOOLYARD

Of our up and down two room schoolhouse there were no oak trees for shade, no grass lawn. There was mud in winter and spring, dust in the fall a sopping American flag waving over it all.

We looked out the window at the weeping willow by the pond. The valley had little else but high weeds, Scotch thistle along the creek, Queen Anne's lace rattling in the southwest breeze.

March arctic storms brought snow for weeks.

FROM THE BACKPORCH

sharp claws— ask any dog, cat). But he will wash them


Pandemic or not with nothing at all going through all the motions


or laves them with dirt or dust if no water is nearby.


Another possibility: the raccoon prays
