

## **Interpretive Team at Catoctin Mountain Park Wins Award by**

Our team won an award for the work we are doing through our 4<sup>th</sup> grade programming with the Maryland School for the Deaf (working in our community), and with a diversity of staff.

Ally Awards are about diversity in the workplace. The award we received represents diversity within our community. We won #7 about diversity and outreach with our local community (Maryland School for the Deaf). See definition below.

I nominated us (Troy Woods, Jason P. and myself) for the 4th grade programming we do with the Maryland School for the Deaf. We are accomplishing diversity in our workplace by including a diverse member of our staff to assist in welcoming and presenting to our diverse school group. We highlighted the support in house by park managers, staff, and our partners. FYI, Troy Woods is our deaf co-worker who works in maintenance. I asked him to come and join us for the programming with the Maryland School for the Deaf as it is his alma mater. He not only joined us, he helped provide programming. In addition, he and I co-presented a lunchtime discussion on how to join the NPS. This was so fun and well received as the students didn't know that they could work for the National Park Service. It was an eye opener and a feel-good moment to share these opportunities with our local students.

#### **Community Outreach – External Communities outside the Department of Interior (Cornerstone #7)**

The intent of this award is to recognize the efforts of employees or office units with proven commitment to and development of an inclusive culture in the communities we serve by giving back through volunteering/attending education or experiential learning opportunities to connect with non-DOI employees (ie. Feds Feeds Families, Toys for Tots, CFC, Career Day, Youth Initiatives, etc.).

- **Criteria:** Nominations must include a brief (200-250 words) narrative succinctly summarizing accomplishments and a more detailed narrative addressing individual or team accomplishments in one or more of the following criteria:
  - o Facilitates outstanding, responsive public service through principled leadership, shared accountability, and educated stakeholders.
  - o Include other relevant factors to further describe the impact and contribution of the nominee's accomplishments and the value of their efforts towards furthering diversity.



#### A Call for Volunteers

The Spirits of the Furnace is an event held by the Catoctin Furnace Historical Society. It is a guided nighttime tour of historic Catoctin Furnace where guests meet ghosts of long dead ironworkers who retell the history of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century iron furnace. They hear the

story of an enslaved butler at the Ironmaster's mansion who tells about preparations for a long-ago dinner party and meet Edward McPherson, a lieutenant in the  $2^{nd}$  dragoons who served in the Mexican American war.

There are lots of volunteer opportunities for this event...actors (speaking and non-speaking), tending fires, serving refreshments), etc., etc.!
